



PAN FLUTE

an you make a musical instrument ງ using a few drinking straws and An experiment with pitch and learn how sound is made by simply blowing air through a straw.

Steps for Making Pan Flutes:

- Lay the straws flat on a table and decide on the lengths you'd like them to be - the larger the steps between the straws, the bigger the difference in pitch.
- Place a long piece of tape on a smooth surface with the sticky side up.
- Arrange the straws on the tape from longest to shortest.
- Fold the tape over the straws and secure it on the other side.
- Play the pan flute by blowing air through the straws.

HOW TO MAKE CHOCOLATE LAVA MUG CAKE?

First, you'll need a large mug.



You'll start by putting 3 tablespoons(TBSP) of butter inside your mug. Melt in the microwave for about 20 seconds.

Add in 3 tablespoons(TBSP) of sugar, 4 tablespoons(TBSP) of all-purpose flour, 2 tablespoons(TBSP) of unsweetened cocoa, and a nice big pinch of salt.

Mix well. You'll see it start to get nice and chocolaty.

Now, we're going to add the wet ingredients. Add 3 tablespoons(TBSP) of milk, 1 egg and 1/2 teaspoon(TSP) of baking powder. Stir until you get a nice, smooth batter.

Lastly, put the mug in the microwave oven for five minutes. Hurray enjoy the sweet little treat.



3 Tbsp melted butter

3 Tbsp sugar

4 Tbsp all-purpose flour

2 Tbsp unsweetened cocoa

3 Tbsp milk

1 egg

1/2 tsp baking powder

1oz chocolate bars

Pinch of salt
